Janet Peeples

When I was a child, my grandmother's house contained a room shadowed in mystery, right inside the front door off the hallway. It had double doors, curtained and usually closed. It was "the parlor," where we rarely spent time except to dust and keep it clean for company. Not so with the room with double doors right off the hallway in Janet Peeples' home on Hearthstone Blvd. Her double doors stand open wide, revealing the biggest selection of fabrics and accessories I've seen apart from a local JoAnn Fabrics store! In the middle of it all sits an unassuming sewing machine... nothing industrial, mind you, just a simple sewing machine, but the products it churns out under Janet's hands are truly awesome!

A native of New Jersey, who grew up in the Cranford area, Janet studied Secretarial Sciences at Union City Technical Institute in Scotch Plains after graduating from high school, where, having been brought up in a family with a love for music, she was in the marching band, high school choir, church choir, concert band and jazz band. She even played in the Suburban Symphony Orchestra in its percussion section.

Through the UCTI placement service, she considered several jobs, but ended up accepting one at Bell Telephone Laboratories (BTL), starting in Piscataway and traveling around other locations during her 27 year tenure with the company, from which she was laid off just shy of six months from retirement (and pension). In spite of the rather insensitive manner in which her employment was terminated, Janet talks with great fondness of her years at Bell Laboratories.

Working as a secretary at BTL, she interacted constantly with some of the brightest, most creative inventors and scientists in the world. She recalls with stunning clarity the man who developed high definition television (HDTV), another who invented the bar codes we see on every product we purchase, another who pi-

oneered the use of 800 numbers and even Arno Penzias, who won the Nobel Prize for his discovery of evidence supporting the Big Bang theory. Being around such highly-charged thinkers was exhilarating and to this day, Janet recalls those days with nostalgic fondness.

From Bell Laboratories, Janet transitioned to the medical world, working in Human Resources and I.T. for the Cooper Health System in Camden and Virtua Hospital in Marlton and Gibbsboro.. The difference in approach was marked, Janet found, and she missed the highly structured, well-organized way in which business had been conducted at Bell Laboratories. The hospital job was rife with stress, leading to years of ill health and, most importantly, reactivating bouts of de-

pression. With the help of her therapist, Janet found she already had a possible way to combat the illness right within her personal history.

The middle daughter of three, Janet, her oldest sister and her mother (still vigorous and active at 86 and able to drive from her home in Bridgewater to visit) were all talented seamstresses. In high school, Janet would see an outfit she liked one day, purchase the pattern and some fabric, sew the garment together and wear it to school the following day. When her two sons, David,



Wine in the Pines

The Pine Barrens of NJ is home to several excellent award-winning wineries that produce a wide variety of red and white wines. Valenzano, Sharrott, Plagido, Amalthea, DiMatteo, Bellview, Tomasello, Renault, Laurita, Coda Rossa, and Balic Wineries, located in Atlantic, Camden, Burlington and Ocean Counties, all offer winery tours and/or tastings. In fact, New Jersey is fifth in the nation in production of wines!

New Jersey wineries produce many of the classic wines, both red and white, and dry or sweet, but it doesn't end there! Cranberry wines, both red and white, are a favorite any time of the year, but it is a local custom during the holidays - a few of the wineries have it for tasting and sale. Bring home several bottles and start your own tradition; it will be a huge hit at holiday dinners! These wineries also take advantage of other south Jersey fruits - you'll find raspberry wines, blueberry sparkling wine, and even dandelion wine at some wineries.

South Jersey provides an excellent climate for vineyards. Global Warming is causing warmer winters, but as a result, grapes are thriving here, enabling oenologists to plant varieties that never before would have survived in this area. It is said that the Pinelands region is much like that of the well-known wine growing regions of France. Winemakers in growing numbers are enhancing New Jersey's nickname, "The Garden State," and raising its status as a home to a number of excellent vineyards producing high quality wines that are garnering much attention and numerous awards.

Valenzano Winery, Shamong, NJ

Through the 1980s and early '90s, the Valenzano family grew grapes and made wine as a hobby on their 7-acre farm in Shamong township. After a decade of

sharing wine with friends and neighbors, Tony Valenzano and his 2 sons, Anthony & Mark decided to convert their hobby into a small business. In 1996 Valenzano Winery became Burlington County's first winery.

Valenzano's first vintage was small but sold well. In 1996 they produced about 1,200 gallons of wine. Valenzano Winery has since acquired 2 new farms/vineyards as their vineyards, and winemaking presence expands year after year. Fifteen years after their inception Valenzano Wines has become a top sold brand in wine stores throughout New Jersey and is clearly recognized as a leader in east-coast winemaking & viticulture.

In 2006 Valenzano Winery became the first winery to win the coveted Governor's Cup Wine Award 2-years-in-a-row for the same varietal. Valenzano Wines have been highly reviewed in the *NY Times* and by many national and local wine experts. In 2010 Valenzano Winery hit its 10th year of a minimum of 50% growth. In 2011 the winery produced and sold 88,000 gallons of wine which ranked them as the 2nd largest producer in New Jersey – quickly approaching the #1 spot.

Valenzano Winery is located at 1090 Route 206, Shamong, NJ, just a short ride from Hearthstone at Woodfield.

Sharrott Winery, Hammonton, NJ

Another new, beautiful winery located in the Pine Barrens is Sharrott Winery. Larry Sharrott, Jr along with his son, Larry III started the winery in 2003 with only four acres of plantings. Since then they have added many more acres of crops. The winery is world class and has won many awards including Best of Class for their Chardonnay and Crimson Sky wines. They offer both dry and sweet wines. Sharrott Winery is open for tasting 7 days a week and tours are offered. Most weekends they have live entertainment or festivals. You will find a schedule of events on their website www.sharrottwinery.com.

now 32 and Bobby, 30, were small, she sewed clothes for them, as well as her own outfits and curtains for her home. But she found herself especially fascinated by quilting and began to take classes she found, to improve her skill—watching her output and continued interest snowballing.

Signing up for a class in Mt. Holly, Janet met Jean Robinson, a resident of Hearthstone at Woodfield, who teaches quilting. There, she began a recent project, a king-sized quilt to be a gift for her husband, which is called “Shadow of a Bear Paw.” It is an ingenious mix of burgundies, browns and beiges, arranged in geometric shapes that will ultimately wind up on the couple’s bed. Doing good things for her husband, Tom, seems to come naturally to Janet and to get her creative juices flowing. A few years back, she completely arranged a surprise trip to Atlanta for the opening game of an Eagles’ season, a trip so well and secretly planned, Tom didn’t know where they going until they were actually at the gate at the airport!

Tom and Janet found Hearthstone at Woodfield while they were living in Sicklerville in a diverse neighborhood they both loved. Wanting to downsize as well as find a home that was on one level, they looked at the Ryan development in Atco, but found it too close to the highway. When they were directed to Pemberton, they

found the area and the neighborhood to be what they wanted, so in 2008, they had their home constructed. Janet has recently found an interesting part-time job that utilizes her skills with a sewing machine and still has time to sit at the one in her home, churning out purses that make Vera Bradley’s creations look shabby as well as showing her work at area craft fairs.

Set a good example for others, too.


- Have heart-to-heart talks with the other drivers in your life about paying attention to the world around them when behind the wheel.

Themed Crossword Puzzle – Do Your Know Your Geography?







Spaghetti and Meatballs



From The Kitchen of
Jean Robinson

- 1 large egg
 - 3 tablespoons fresh basil, finely chopped (plus more for serving)
 - 3 tablespoons fresh parsley, finely chopped
 - 1 teaspoon dried oregano
 - ¼ teaspoon salt
 - ¼ teaspoon pepper
 - 2 cloves garlic, minced
 - ¼ cup water
 - 1 ½ pounds ground "meatloaf mix" (approximately equal parts ground beef, pork & veal)
 - ¾ cup dried Italian Style bread crumbs (such as Progresso)
 - ½ cup freshly grated Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese (plus more for serving)
 - Large jar (32 oz) good quality Marinara sauce, such as Rao's
 - 1 pound spaghetti
1. Set rack in middle position and preheat oven to 350 degrees.
 2. In a large bowl, whisk together egg, basil, parsley, oregano, salt, pepper, garlic and water. Add meat, breadcrumbs and Parmesan and mix until just combined (your hands are the best tool). Do not overwork it.
 3. Using your hands, take about 2 tablespoons of meat mixture (about the size of a golf ball) at a time and gently roll into balls. Place meatballs on ungreased baking sheet and bake for about 10 minutes. Remove pan from oven and use a metal spatula to turn meatballs (they will stick a bit but should release easily when you scrape under them with metal spatula). Put back in oven and cook another 10 minutes, until meatballs are nicely browned.
 4. In the meantime, bring the marinara sauce to a simmer in a large sauté pan. Taste it and adjust the seasoning if necessary (I usually add a healthy pinch of sugar and freshly ground black pepper). When the meatballs are browned, transfer them to the pan with tomato sauce, leaving the fat behind. Cover loosely with foil and simmer over low heat for about 10 minutes, until the flavors marry and the meatballs are cooked through. Keep warm until ready to toss with pasta.
 5. While meatballs are simmering, bring a large pot of well-salted water to a boil. Add spaghetti and cook al dente. Drain, then toss with sauce and meatballs; garnish with fresh basil and serve. Pass the grated Parmesan.
